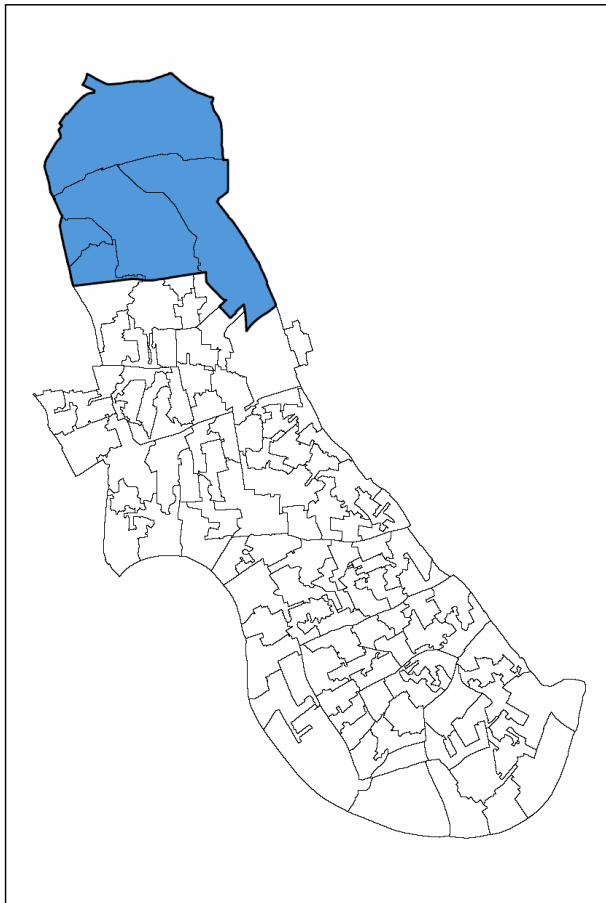


WARD PROFILE – COLLEGE PARK & OLD OAK

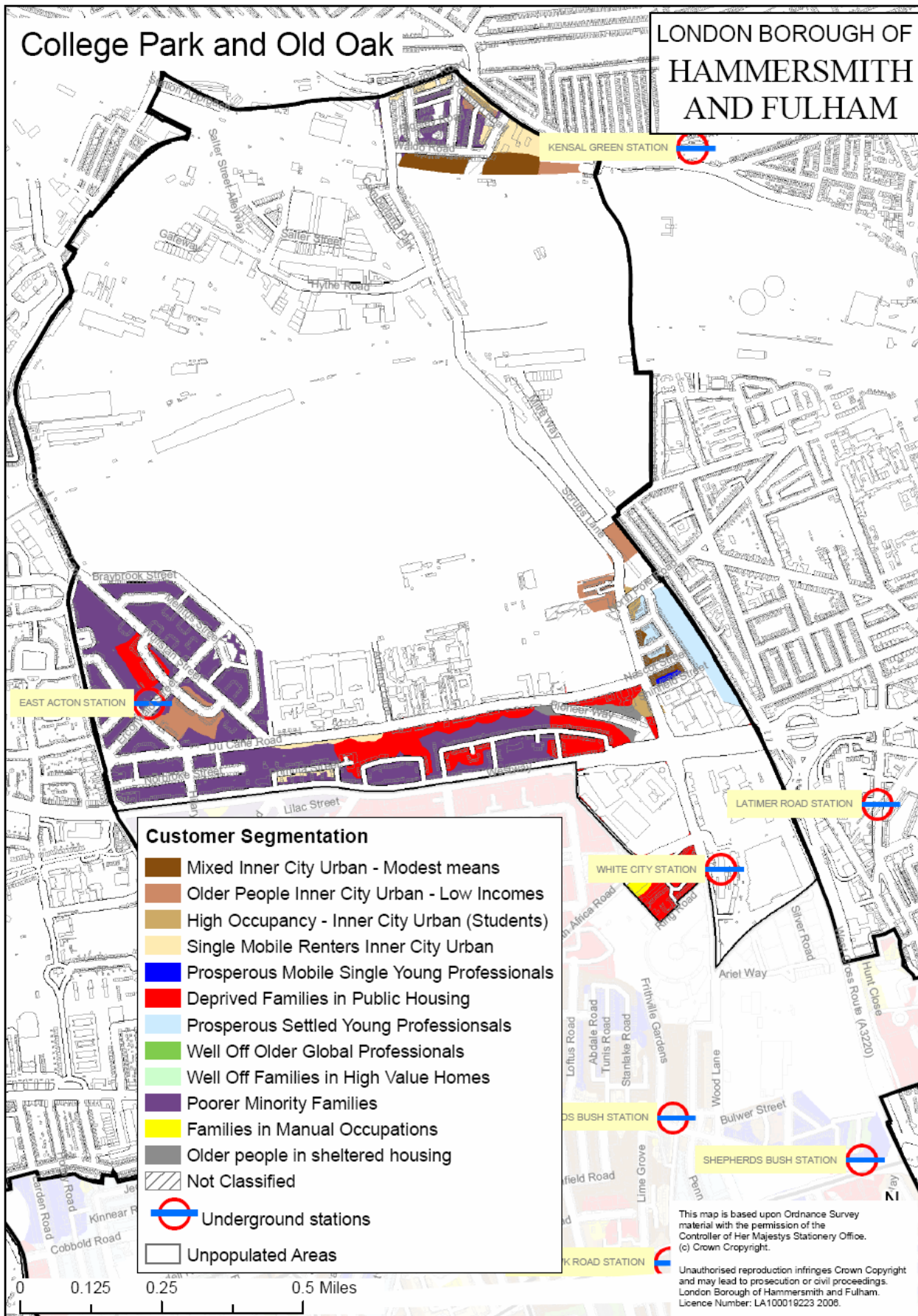
1. CUSTOMER SEGMENTATION

What is customer segmentation?

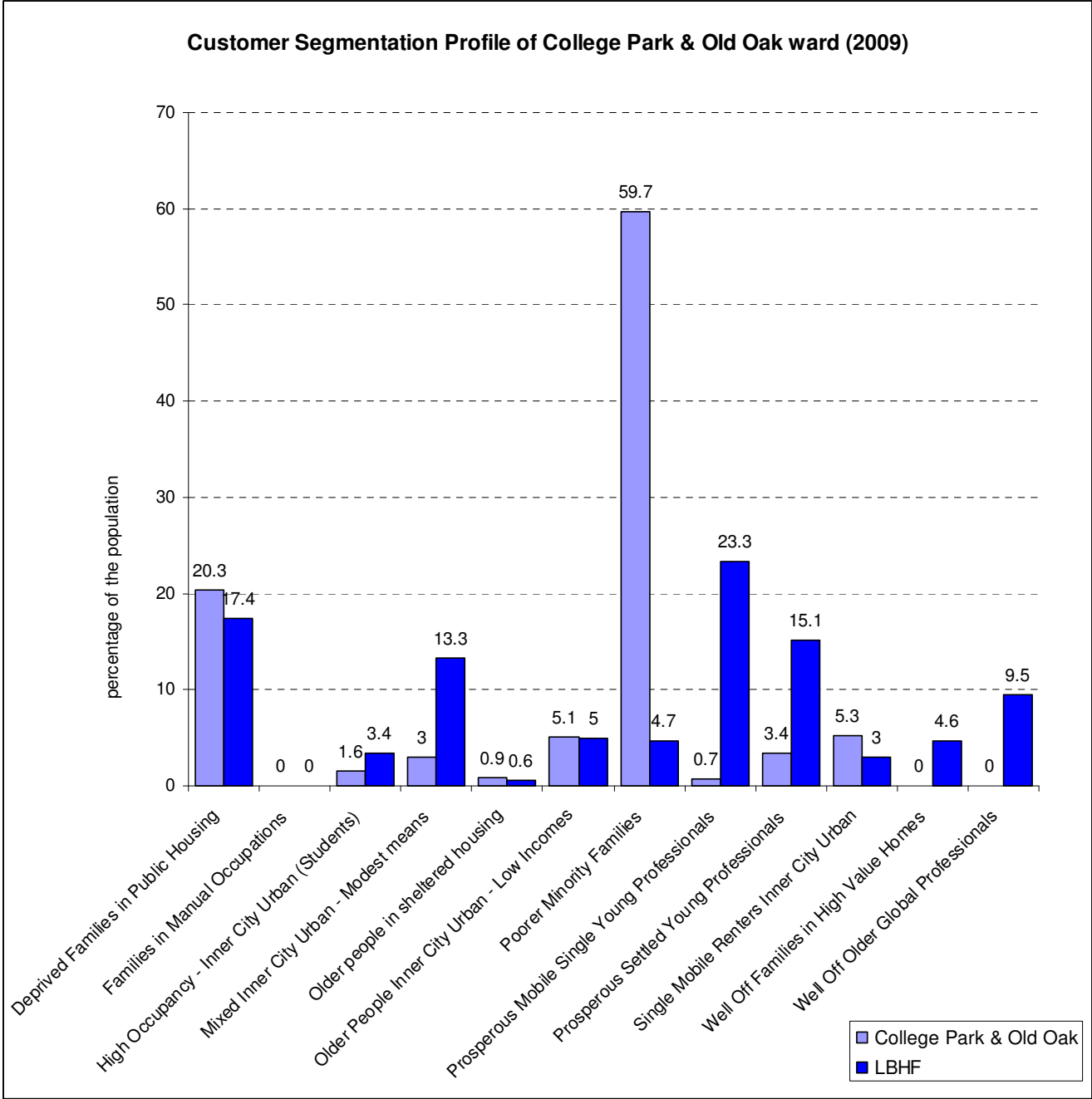
- The exercise involves using data to classify the resident population of the borough into one of 12 groups or segments.
- The classification into segments allows assumptions to be drawn about the preferred behaviour of the segment groups, and helps the council understand where to focus its service provision to meet the needs and preferences of its residents.²
- As can be seen on the map below, the two predominant customer segmentations in College Park & Old Oak ward are: Poor Minority Families and Deprived Families in Public Housing.
- Large areas of the ward are unpopulated.
- The chart shows the breakdown of customer segmentation in College Park & Old Oak ward in comparison to the whole borough (2009 data).

5. EXPLANATORY INFORMATION AND GEOGRAPHY

Electoral Wards

- Electoral wards are the geographical administrative units used to elect local councillors and form a key part of the political geography of the borough.
- It should be noted that the population count of wards varies both between and within local authorities.
- Ward boundaries are also subject to change, and sometimes complete reclassification, by the Boundary Commission.

Borough sub-division

- The London Borough of Hammersmith and Fulham is also divided up into sub-divisions based on the three town centres of Shepherd's Bush, Hammersmith and Fulham.
- The sub-divisions represent the north (Shepherd's Bush), central (Hammersmith) and south (Fulham) of the borough.
- The sub-divisions are made up of groups of wards and split the borough into areas of approximately equal population. This aids comparison and allows differences in survey data to be analysed across the whole borough.
- The borough is sub-divided as follows:

Central	Addison; Avonmore and Brook Green; Fulham Reach; Hammersmith Broadway; North End; Ravenscourt Park
South	Fulham Broadway; Munster; Palace Riverside; Parsons Green; Town; Sands End

Super Output Areas

- SOAs as a level of data provision were introduced by the Office for National Statistics to improve the quality and comparability of small area statistics in England and Wales.³
- SOAs are groupings of Output Areas (OAs) used in the Census. There are 111 SOAs in Hammersmith and Fulham as compared to 16 electoral wards.
- SOAs have two main advantages over electoral wards when supplying data. Firstly, SOAs are fixed in size (dependent on the level of population residing therein) and secondly, SOA boundaries will not change over time. This promotes comparability of data both geographically (throughout England and Wales) and over time.
