

THE ROUTE

Starting at Barons Court Station turn right into Margravine Gardens.

Turn left into Hammersmith Cemetery.

Walk along the pathway to the Field Road exit towards the hospital.

(Optional - turn right at the central circle, and come back to the Field Road exit.)

From Field Road turn left into Greyhound Road.

Turn right into Musard Road.

Over Disbrowe Road into Moylan Road.

Turn left into Lillie Road.

Turn left into Tilton Street towards Fulham Pools.

You are now in Normand Park.

Carry on along the pathway, across the courtyard, toward the bowling green. Turn right and follow the path to Lillie Road.

Turn left into Lillie Road, cross over Mulgrave Road to the zebra crossing. Cross Lillie Road and go into the Clem Attlee Estate.

Keep Jim Griffiths House to your right. Turn left into the central gardens at Margaret Herbison House. Exit by the path to the right of Kenneth Younger House (ahead of you) into St Thomas's Way.

Follow the road around past the Wellington pub into Haldane Road (Beware: pathway is narrow and you should look out for on-coming traffic).

Cross over North End Road at pedestrian crossing (to your right), into Halford Road.

Turn left into Tamworth Street, and right into Sedlescombe Road.

Continued

THE ROUTE continued

Turn left into Ongar Road. At the end of the road, cross Lillie Road into the private road leading to The Empress State Building. Walk around the piazza and return, turning right into Lillie Road.

Turn right into North End Road.

Walk towards West Kensington Station. Turn right into Beaumont Crescent.

Turn right on return to North End Road and cross pedestrian crossing, into Barons Court Road.


Follow Barons Court Road back to Barons Court Station.

LOOK OUT FOR THESE

- 1 ABE SMITH'S TOMB** commemorates his time as a gold digger in Australia. He died in 1923.
- 2 NORMAND PARK** was created after St. Katherine's Convent was destroyed by bombing in 1944.
- 3 CLEM ATTLEE**, Labour Prime Minister 1945-1951, opened this estate in 1957. Each block/road was named after a prominent Labour politician.
- 4 NORTH END ROAD MARKET** has been in existence since at least the 1880s.
- 5 VICTORIAN RAILINGS** were often removed for munitions during the 1945 war. Fine examples of those remaining can be seen on this walk - for example in Halford Road.
- 6 EMPRESS STATE BUILDING** stands on the site of the Empress Hall, originally built when Queen Victoria became Empress of India.
- 7 MARCUS GARVEY 1887-1940**, Jamaican pioneer of black education lived in this area. In the late 1930s, he published 'The Blackman' newspaper from this site.
- 8 MAHATMA GANDHI 1869-1948**, Indian peace activist, lived here while studying law.




BOROUGH WALKS - 4
