The meeting was arranged to allow National Grid to introduce their proposals for the Fulham Gas Work. Items put forward for discussion were:

- LBHF priorities
- Overview of National Grid property
- Joint venture and Fulham.
- Hazardous Substances licence

Meeting Record:

LBHF priorities

Councillor Cowan provided an overview of the new administration's manifesto commitments as they apply to the proposed regeneration scheme. In response to a housing crisis and London's demand for affordable homes greatly increased emphasis and priority on delivery of more affordable housing with housing types and tenures to be genuinely affordable to a range of incomes in line with the London Plan. Expressed concern about a number of regeneration schemes that appear not to be occupied – 'lights out issue' and an expectation that marketing of new homes would be targeted at local people and Londoners rather than foreign investors

- National Grid Property
- -Responsible for redundant sites and surplus land
- -Expertise in site clean up
- -Manage commercial tenants
- -Disposals
- Joint Venture and Fulham

Recent announcement of a joint venture partnership 'St William' with the Berkeley Group. The Fulham site may be redeveloped by the joint venture.

Site clean-up, demolition of the gas holders and relocation of operational gas pipes and kit will be undertaken by National Grid. It is currently estimated that it will therefore be 3-4 years before the site is ready for development.

Will be further detailed discussion on the Fulham site once a development partner is in place and the Council would want to discuss partners to deliver affordable housing and low cost home ownership.

Hazardous Substances Consent

This is currently hindering redevelopment of nearby sites. The recent planning permission for demolition of the gasholders provides a degree of certainty re future re-development to enable the revocation of the Hazardous Substance Consent licence. Agreed in this instance the Council should formally request National Grid to revoke the licence.
