History of Ravenscourt Park

To the north of the park is the site of Ravenscourt House (formerly known as Paddenswick House), which was destroyed by bombing in 1941.

The stable block still stands and is used as the café.

The Manor of Pallingswick, or Paddenswick, was once owned by Alice Perrers, a companion of Edward III. The park's provenance dates back to the 13th century.

The 'new' name of Ravenscourt first appeared in 1759 and the last private owner of the house and grounds was George Scott who employed the well known landscape architect, Humphrey Repton, to improve the park and create serpentine paths which remain today.

Ravenscourt Park was officially opened as a public park in 1888 and now provides a wide range of recreational facilities.
